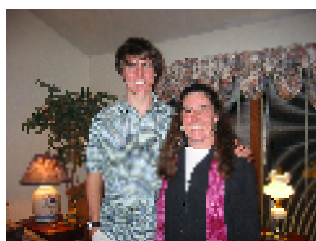
Youth Exchange News

The Youth Exchange Multi-District project Karen has been working on with many others for the past 2 years has been approved by RI and founding districts are 7170, 7150 and 7120. This is expected to reduce cost and paperwork as well as improve consistency on policies, procedures, forms and orientation/training to help make it easier to comply with current and anticipated requirements and audits from CSIET, Dept of State and Rotary International.

The official name registered for the multi-district is NYSSEX (New York State Student Exchange) and is also registered as a 503C organization. Each district will continue to have its own website.

Industry Literacy and Mentoring Project

CHANGING THE FUTURE; ONE STUDENT AT A TIME

There are many misconceptions concerning the State School at Industry. Hopefully, this will clear some of them up.

There are two separate facilities that make up the school. There is Secure where the more serious offenders are placed (longer time served), and the Residential facility where the lesser offenders are housed. Their term of incarceration at residential is from 3-12 months. This facility is where our volunteers work.

There are 90 beds at residential with a current population of 52 boys. 23 from Monroe County, 23 from other upstate counties and 6 from down state(NYC area). With most of the population from our area, we felt it imperative to create this project, to assist the boys in a positive way so they may become more productive citizens when released.

Presently they are housed in 5 cottages. Two are being renovated. They attend regular school classes five days per week from 8:30am-3:15pm, with a break each day for lunch. They may participate in a Regents program or a GED program. They adhere to a mandated NYS curriculum. There are Special Education Teachers on site to assist students with learning disabilities or those working below grade level. (Our volunteers work in the class room and one/one with students wishing to improve their class room skills.)

The residents participate in varied activities including working in the cafeteria kitchen (cooking and serving), the retail store (learning sales and marketing skills) and custodial projects. They are paid a stipend for these services, with some accumulating a few hundred dollars given them when released. (The residents must have a clean record and show an interest in these programs in order to participate).

Most attend chapel weekly with special services conducted during the calendar year. There is a chaplain available to assist those with special needs or concerns. Rev. Carter also plans activities for the boys to participate regularly. There are also social workers , mental health workers, psychologists, vocational specialists and other related staff to assist the residents.

There are many church groups, community groups, college students and volunteers that participate on a regular basis to show the boys that people really care. This is important in their development as this one/one contact is lacking from their home environment. Often a boy does not understand why someone would take the time to help them without being compensated. Some are suspicious at first, but more often than not the volunteer is rewarded with a smile, a thank you or the knowledge they have helped a boy to take a positive step toward being a valuable citizen.

If you have one hour a week to participate as a volunteer, we can use your talent!!!! You do not have to be a teacher or a scholar; all you need to possess is patience and want to Change The Future: One Student at a Time.
